In a Nutshell:

A bright, light, and fruity natural 'Vin de Soif' (thirst-quenching wine) from Romania.

The Lowdown:

Made from organically farmed grapes with minimal intervention in the winery, this juicy red wine resembles a Beaujolais in style. Whole grape bunches ferment naturally over three weeks and the wine is bottled without filtration, fining, or the addition of sulphur. The result is a light red packed with strawberry, bubblegum, and ripe red cherry flavours, matched with refreshing acidity.

Tasting Notes:

- **Appearance:** Bright and light red hue.
- **Aroma:** Fresh strawberry and bubblegum with a hint of ripe red cherry.
- **Palate:** Juicy and vibrant with dominant strawberry and cherry flavours.
- **Finish:** Refreshing acidity that leaves you wanting more.
- **Serving Tip:** Best served slightly chilled to enhance its thirst-quenching qualities.

The Producer:

Cramele Recas, located just outside Timisoara in western Romania, has undergone a transformation since the early 2000s under the leadership of Bristolian Philip Cox and his Romanian wife Elvira. Their 700-hectare estate is one of the largest in the country, producing a wide range of wines. With extensive vineyards in an area known for great terroir and ancient viticulture, combined with modern, quality-focused production methods, they create excellent and good-value wines. Cramele Recas successfully cultivates both indigenous and international varieties, offering wines from entry-level to premium cuvées that compare favourably with those from any region worldwide.
